BURR OAK'S NEW MURAL

As the City of Burr Oak gears up for its 150th birthday celebration in 2021, beautification projects are beginning to take shape. With a variety of projects throughout the town, the huge, unkempt wall on the side of a building on Highway 128 was next on the list to be transformed.

The Jewell County Community Foundation awarded the City funding to hire artist Callum McNichols for this project. The main body for the mural was completed by McNichols and he left the accompanying barn quilts for the rest of the community to paint. "In addition to boosting the morale of the town's residents, hundreds of people annually drive by and can't help but have a more positive attitude about the state of our small town. This project would not have been possible or accomplished at all without the generous support of this grant," said grantee Jessica Barnes.

CUSTOM BANNERS

The City of Jewell enrolled in the "First Impressions" program and traded communities with Miltonvale to better understand a "true" first impression of the community. Through that program, the City of Jewell learned that their downtown provided visitors with a positive experience. To keep the positive momentum going, a committee of residents have continued to look at ways to improve downtown.

Recently, the Jewell Chamber of Commerce took inventory of the downtown banners and found that they were ripped and weathered. With a grant from the community foundation, they were able to purchase new custom banners to display during the spring and summer seasons as well as new awnings for the community center.

"With all of the activities planned, there could not have been a better year to focus on updating and creating a more vibrant, welcoming downtown area," said grantee Shelby Bohnert. "The repainted streetlights, new custom light pole banners and new awnings on the community center all create a more attractive downtown area for residents, businesses, and visitors in our community."

COMMUNITY CENTER UPDATES

With a collaboration between fundraisers, grants and volunteers, the community of Esbon came together to remodel the old fire hall into a community center in 2015. Since the remodel, natural deterioration has occurred to the building's roof.

The community foundation awarded a grant to seal and coat the metal roof. "The community center has been a wonderful addition to the community in the last five years. This project helped preserve the building for future use in the years to come," said grantee Barb Mizner.







BOOKS FOR OUR CHILDREN

Research shows that over the first five years of a childs life, the human brain develops more rapidly than any other time. This makes it essential that during this time period children develop the brain connections needed for many important, higher-level abilities like motivation, self-regulation, problem solving and communication. It is recommended that parents and caregivers read with their children daily starting in infancy so that children start kindergarten with adequate literacy skills.

Smoky Hills Public Television helps prepare children for kindergarten and to develop a life-long love for learning. The outreach program targets preschool children by providing books to kids attending Head Start or public preschool. The foundation granted Smoky Hills Public Television a grant to provide three books to each of the children enrolled in preschool at Rock Hills Elementary School. "Because of grants like yours, we were able to give at least one book to nearly 2,400 children enrolled in Head Start or public preschool in central and western Kansas," said grantee Helen Hands.



SAFER BURNS

Even controlled burns can still be dangerous. The correct equipment can make all the difference in an unforeseen situation. The Burn Association was given a truck by the forestry service to aid in control of fires.

With the support from a community foundation grant, the association was able to equip trucks and tanks with the necessary pumps and plumbing to more effectively keep control of fires. Grantee Charles Smies expressed the association's gratitude and said, "What a blessing to receive grant money for our fire related needs. As a rural burn association, we operate on a very small or non-existent budget and these grants help us to fulfill our mission and keep our volunteers safe. We were able to buy a gas engine with diaphragm pump, transfer pump, and leg tank with the grant money. Thank you for the grant."






